The aim of Lesbian Visibility Day (LVD) is to highlight the issues facing women and non-binary people who identify as lesbian, gay, bisexual, pansexual, queer, having a fluid sexuality, asexual or questioning. This day is an opportunity to shine a light on their perspectives, challenges and contributions, which are all too often invisible in LGBTQIA2S+ events, at both the local and international levels.

INHABITING SPACE

To celebrate the 42nd anniversary of the LVD, the Réseau des lesbiennes du Québec (RLQ) is launching a campaign entitled Habiter l'espace (Inhabiting Space). It is a call to celebrate lesbo-gueer women and people taking their place in public spaces. Their words and initiatives, imbued with courage and resilience, open the door to others seeking to inhabit public spaces.

By celebrating the different spaces occupied and created by lesbo-queer women and people, and the multiple ways in which they inhabit them, we open the way for those who also wish to find their place, to be seen and to be heard.

CAMPAIGN MATERIALS

The campaign includes posters, stickers and a social media calendar featuring quotes from lesbo-queer women and people who, in their own way, inhabit space.

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LESBOPHOBIA

The main goal of LVD is to combat lesbophobia in all spheres of society.

Lesbophobia is a specific phobia that affects women who love women because of their sexual orientation, in other words, lesbians, bisexual, pansexual and gay women in lesbian relationships, and people who are socially perceived as lesbians. This phobia is rooted in the intersection of homophobia and sexism.

Lesbophobia manifests itself as negative attitudes, discrimination, contempt, invisibilization, rejection and hatred directed at lesbians. It can also lead to acts of intimidation or violence, harming a person's psychological, physical or sexual integrity.

about the RLQDIN

The Réseau des lesbiennes du Québec (RLQ) is a Québec-wide independent community action organization that has been involved in rights advocacy since 1996. The RLQ collectively defends the rights of women and people in lesbo-queer communities, amplifying their voices and visibility so that they may enjoy their full human rights. The RLQ serves as a spokesperson with decision-making bodies, both political and social, regarding the quality and conditions of life of lesbians, women and lesbo-queer people and their communities. It is the only community-based collective advocacy organization that exclusively represents Quebec's LGBTQ2S+ women who love women, and it has amassed considerable expertise. It is the central reference for issues affecting lesbian communities in Quebec.
